



Andrus Road to Airport Boulevard

Multi-Use Path Project

Project Information Sheet

[What is the Andrus Road to Airport Boulevard project?](#)

The Andrus Road to Airport Boulevard project is a City of Boulder transportation project that will construct a 10-foot-wide, off-street, concrete multi-use path between Andrus Road and the Airport Road office park. The final project design was created through the collaboration of the city's Public Works and Open Space and Mountain Parks Departments and between the city and Boulder County.

The Andrus Road to Airport Boulevard project will improve the city's system of multi-use paths, regional bicycling travel, and off-street and multi-use path connectivity between Gunbarrel and the Boulder urban center.

[What are the benefits of the Andrus Road to Airport Boulevard project?](#)

The project will provide the following improvements:

- Construction of a new multi-use path
- Construction of an at-grade crossing at 61st street, along the proposed path alignment
- Construction of a pedestrian/bicycle bridge over Fourmile Canyon Creek along the proposed path alignment

[How will the city fund the project?](#)

The project budget is around \$400,000 and is funded entirely with city transportation funds.

[Why is this project needed?](#)

The Andrus Road to Airport Boulevard project, one of three connections identified in the area of the confluence of Boulder Creek and South Boulder Creek (Confluence Area), provides a much needed multi-modal connection between Gunbarrel and the city's urban center. This missing link, identified since the 1980s in the City of Boulder's Transportation Master Plan (TMP), will provide improved bicycling and pedestrian facilities for residents, employees and visitors to the city.

Additionally, the project improvements support the following TMP goals:

1. Creating travel options through construction of multimodal facilities
2. Supporting regional travel

[Will the City of Boulder acquire more land for this project?](#)

The project will be constructed on city Open Space and Mountain Parks land and will not require land to be purchased to complete.

When will the project begin?

Planning and design began in fall, 2015, and will be completed in winter, 2016. Construction is currently estimated to begin summer, 2016, and will take six months to complete, depending on weather conditions, contractor schedules and material delivery.
