THE PLAN

The Draft Historic Preservation Plan reflects considerable public input and aspires to define a vision that will guide the diverse initiatives, programs, needs, opportunities, goals, and principles of the City of Boulder's historic preservation activities. On a practical level it is intended to identify implementable work program priorities that will assist in achieving the city's historic preservation goals and objectives.

The Plan begins with an overview of the purpose of the plan's development and a brief history of historic preservation efforts in Boulder. The second section includes description and analysis of the current program areas and is a summary of the Current Program Assessment the board and public reviewed in February. The third section, *A Sense of Purpose*, establishes the Goals and Objectives of the Plan and describes the Recommendations, which are organized by theme (Historic Resource Protection, Community Engagement and Collaboration, and Program Operation). The following chart prioritizes the Recommendations into Near-Term (1-5 years) and Long-Term (5-10) timeframes and identifies the related objective and responsible parties. The prioritization takes into account the resources currently available and reflects the philosophy that the current program should be strengthened prior to the commencement of additional initiatives.
