There will be a free tour of Chautauqua prior to the award ceremony, leaving from the Community House at 4 p.m.



Walking Tour of Homes of Boulder's African-American Pioneers

Meet at 23rd and Goss streets in Boulder to join Dan Corson on a walking tour featuring the homes of Boulder's pioneer and early African-American families. The tour begins in the former semi-pastoral area once boasting orchards and small gardens that became increasingly segregated in the early 20th century due to unofficial redlining. The small vernacular homes on Goss Street between 19th and 23rd streets became known as the "Little Rectangle." Re-enactment Performance: Helen Hunt Jackson, Advocate for American Indians, 1800s

Helen Maria Hunt Jackson became an activist on behalf of improved treatment of Native Americans by the U.S. government through two major books that she wrote. She detailed the adverse effects of U.S. government actions in her book, *A Century of Dishonor* (1881), and was appointed Chief of Indian Affairs. Her novel, *Ramona*, dramatized the prejudice toward mixed marriages among the Indians/Mexicans/Americans. The novel has been adapted for other media, including three films, stage, and television productions. Bonnie Kohl, former educator and member of Territorial Daughters of Colorado, will perform the re-enactment. Tickets are \$15 and include the performance and lunch of barbecue beef/pork sandwich buffet. Digging Allenspark: an 1864 Mystery Comes to Life

Last summer, Allenspark dug into its past – specifically, the 1864 fireplace of their namesake, Alonzo Allen, who built a cabin east of town in 1864. The cabin was rumored to have burned to the ground in 1894, the year of his death. Did it really burn? Was the year a coincidence? How big was the cabin and what did it look like? Professional and volunteer archaeologists came together to investigate the mysteries of the man and his cabin. Local historian Edie DeVese will talk about this dig that unearthed fascinating answers, a few new questions, and amazing artifacts, some of which will be on display. The program will include slides of the dig and stories about the man who gave Allenspark his name.

Louisville's Jefferson Place Neighborhood: Its History and Architecture

With a grant from the State Historical Fund, the firm of Avenue L Architects has completed a historical and architectural survey of Jefferson Place, which is Louisville's oldest residential neighborhood, assisted by the Louisville Historical Museum. At this program, they will present the survey results and possible historic district eligibility, as well as discuss architectural styles and how to identify them yourself.
